- 6. Do people act differently when they are in disguise? Explain.
- 7. Why do the hunters let the fire go out? How might this occurrence effect the relationship between Ralph and Jack?
- 8. Jack brings back meat. How might this begin to alter the power balance on the island?
- 9. If you were 12, who would you follow—Jack or Ralph? Why?
- 10. Why is it that Jack is able to kill a pig now? How has he changed and why?
- 11. Ralph accepts meat from the pig. How does he feel about himself doing this and why?
